

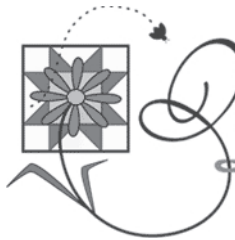

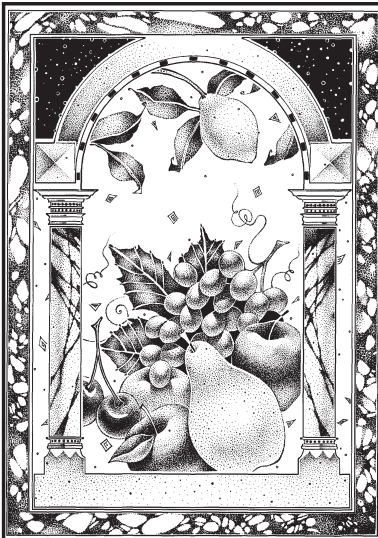

## Attention All Backyard Fruit Enthusiasts...

Well, we've eaten our way through most of the backyard at this point in our seminar. Over the last year we've covered everything from Apples to Walnuts; pruning to feeding; training to spraying, and much more. We've planted bare root trees, pruned large trees in our landscape, and began training some grapes on an arbor. Participants have taken home berries, herbs, vegetables, countless seed packets, and seed potatoes to grow at home along side their fruit trees and bushes. It's about time to wrap up the year with a little harvest party!

**Join us for our latest installment of the seminar to learn some tricks of growing espaliered fruit trees and get some great ideas for what to do with your fruit once harvested.** All of the handouts from previous classes will be available for all that have missed our past topics. Livermore Garden Club President and baker extraordinaire, Lydia Roberts will be on hand to demonstrate some great recipes using fresh fruit (and of course, *we will just have to sample*). We will view some fun videos on pruning and high-density planting from Dave Wilson Nursery and share ideas that will help you achieve the edible backyard of your dreams.

September is one of our most fruit filled months in this area, and also marks the beginning of the historic time honored tradition of walnut harvest season. I can only imagine, some time ago when walnut groves stretched out all around the tri-valley, this would be when you'd see the shaker tractors out at dawn to begin the harvest. I'd also imagine it would be paradise for squirrels! This month will also provide Apples, Pears, late Peaches, Pluots, Almonds, and early Pomegranates. So, keep up with harvesting and summer pruning through this time of year, and remember to prune Apricot trees before we start to get rain to help prevent diseases before they start. ## Bringing Houseplants Indoors

Now that cooler night temps are on the horizon, it is time to bring your houseplants back indoors. Most houseplants will be damaged by temps in the lower 50's and below, so it is too cold to leave outdoors, especially in unprotected areas.

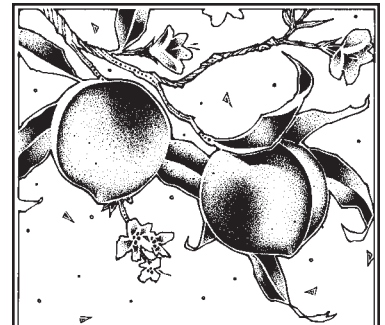
Inspect them carefully for insects and keep them away from your other houseplants for a few weeks until you can determine if they have pests or not. If you are unsure of insects lurking on your plants, you can do a preventative spray of organic **Neem Oil** before you reintroduce them back into your home. If you have plants that are seriously infected with bugs such as mealybug or scale, it would be safer to discard severely infested plants than to risk infecting your other houseplants.

Plants that have outgrown their pots over the summer will need repotting. Check the rootball by tapping the outer pot and gently removing the plant. If it consists of a mass of roots with very little soil showing, it needs repotting in a larger container with fresh potting soil, and a helping of **Osmocote Slow Release Fertilizer**.

Use **Cactus Mix** for those plants that like to dry out thoroughly in between watering, such as *Dracaena* and *Philodendron*. Prune if needed. Plants may experience some leaf drop as they adjust to lower light levels. Growth will begin to slow down as well, so adjust your watering to accommodate indoor conditions, meaning less light and air movement. Don't water too frequently and your houseplants will survive the transition smoothly.

# Notes for September Gardening

♪ Fall is a great time to refresh the soil in your vegetable garden especially if you are planting a winter garden. **Bumper Crop, Gold Rush or Paydirt** will replenish the fertility of your soil as well as enhance the texture. Bumper Crop and Gold Rush include 15% Chicken manure, Paydirt 25%. See our *Recipe for Good Garden Soil* in this issue.

♪ September is a wonderful month to get a start on **winter vegetables and flowers**. The earlier you set out your cool crops, the better. Cabbage and broccoli will grow especially large if started now. Lettuces are another good choice, plant carrots or radishes from seed.

♪ **Chrysanthemums** just say “fall”! We have many wonderful colors to choose from. Use in the garden, for pots and for seasonal indoor decorating.

♪ This is the month to prevent weeds. If you have Oxalis, (small clover like leaves with a yellow flower,) or annual bluegrass, your garden has already been seeded for next year’s crop. Thousands of the microscopic seeds have been distributed after the Spring and Summer flower season. Apply **Master Nursery Pre-emergent Weed Preventer and Lawn Food** to lawns now, and apply **Amaze® Grass and Weed Preventer** throughout ornamental beds to prevent yellow creeping oxalis and annual blue grass weeds. The window of opportunity for prevention of these weeds is now through October.

♪ **Sow flower seeds**. Many wild-flowers and spring annuals grow from seeds scattered now. Try California Poppy, Bachelor Button, and Alyssum.

♪ **Freshen flowerbeds** with new plantings of annuals. Choose pansies, violas, calendulas, snapdragons, stock and more.

♪ Feed your fruit trees one last time until March for increased vigor in the spring. Use **Master’s Fruit and Vine Food**.

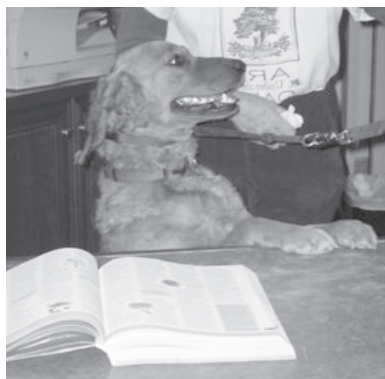
♪ **Revitalize your lawn now with these easy steps:** Thatch, aerate, add Iron Sulfate, Gypsum, Master Start Fertilizer and topdress with Gold Rush or Paydirt, water in with GroMore’s E-Z Wet. It’s also a great month to plant a brand new lawn.

♪ **Bring in houseplants** that have summered outdoors before the nights get too cool. Wash them off thoroughly with warm water and check for hitchhiking pests.

♪ Fall is a great time to **plant old-fashioned favorites** such as sweet peas, hollyhock, Canterbury bells, and foxgloves. Planting them now will insure a beautiful spring.

♪ Our fall planted, **spring blooming bulbs** are arriving everyday. Plant ranunculus and anemones as soon as you can get them in the ground. The same applies for Bearded Iris.



## Hailey's Comments

*Greetings! I am Hailey, the resident nursery dog of Alden Lane. I have been paper trained and am proud of the schooling and personal experience I have as a garden enthusiast, dog professional and mastering the art of raising litters of plants, pups and progeny (children, offspring of plant or animal). September is here and the litters are “Back to School” or “Obedience Training” in Dog Speak.*

*Just read here at press time that scientists have finally concluded dogs have an I.Q. equivalent to a 2-year-old human. I don’t know why it took them so long to figure this out. Human children train there parents to get whatever the child needs using only about 50 words. The average dog develops a vocabulary of about 165 words. 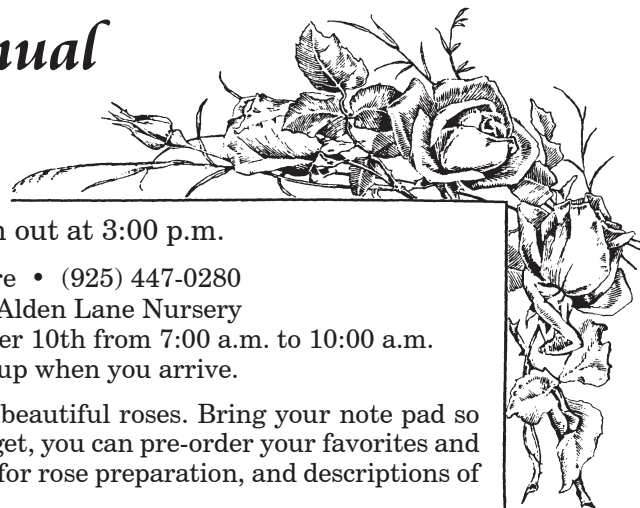

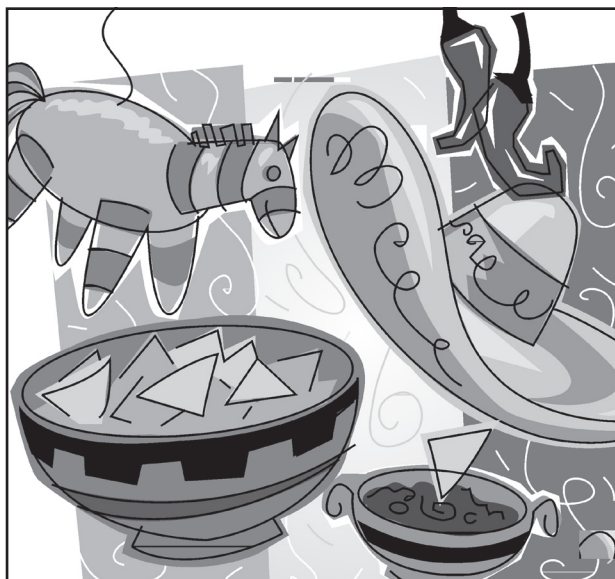

### GOOD GARDEN SOIL!

For each 100 square feet add:

- 5 to 8– 2 cubic ft. bags **Master Gold Rush, Bumper Crop®**, or **Pay Dirt**
- 5 lbs. **Iron Sulfate** to acidify and add iron.
- 10 lbs. **Master Vegetable Food** or **Master Flower Food**, **Master Formula 49** can be used for ground covers.
- 50 lbs. **Gypsum**. It loosens hard soils as it adds sulfur & calcium. (An excellent addition in our heavy soil.)

# Fall is California's Second Spring – Plant Now!

Fall is in the air. Temperatures are moderating. There still remains 2 to 2½ months before winter rains arrive and temperatures drop significantly. In northern California we are blessed with a second spring and this weather is perfect for planting.

You are home now, school has started and the summer vacations are behind you. The harshest heat of summer has passed. It really is a good time to put down some roots. A tree shrub or perennial planted now will establish quickly with the nice warm soil. Winter rains will soon take over the watering chores and next spring, a plant that established its roots this fall will be significantly larger than if planted later. Fall is an active growing time. Take advantage of it by doing some gardening or landscaping now.

## Plant Sweet Peas this Fall for a Glorious Fragrant Bouquet in Spring

September and October are sweet pea planting months for us here in the mild-winter west. We have a great selection of sweet peas to choose from including the earliest bloomers and the very popular Old Fashioned varieties. Old Fashioned sweet peas are particularly fragrant.



Sweet peas planted now, in a manure-rich soil, will sprout and establish themselves well before winter cool temperatures arrive. The earliest ones can actually bloom as soon as January as they require just 10 hours of sunlight per day to set buds. The later varieties will be nice large plants by the time early spring arrives and will set a profusion of blooms. Sweet peas are beautiful and fragrant and they make great cut flowers. Choose from dozens of varieties including a number of mixes.

## Bearded Iris Are Here!

Plant Bearded Iris now to spread a surprisingly vibrant splash of color through the garden this coming spring. Available in saltwater taffy colors, this old fashioned favorite is a great addition to any garden. For the greatest impact, plant several corms of the same color/variety together. You will be stunned with the results. Lighten the soil with **Master's Planting Mix** and enrich with **Master's Bulb Food**.

## Fall Bulbs Especially For California

## Exotic and Practical – Kiwi is a Great Addition to the Garden

Although thought of as an exotic or even tropical fruit, Kiwis can be easily grown in our climate. The large leaves of this vigorous vine are quite ornamental, and look great trained on a trellis or arbor. Male and female plants can be grown together or separately, but both must be present for the female plant to bear fruit. Kiwis can be very large woody vines or can be controlled by winter dormant pruning making it an ideal edible replacement for wisteria or climbing roses trained on large structures or fences. Alden Lane is currently offering a selection of both male and female Kiwis ideal for fall planting. Give them regular water to develop an extensive root system, and once

established these hardy vines will need little care while providing loads of tasty, egg – sized fruit.

## Plant Black Eyed Susan for a Wonderful Touch of Autumn in the Garden

Although we all know the chrysanthemum as one of the outstanding beauties of the autumn garden there's another glorious plant that should also have top billing – Rudbeckia or Black Eyed Susan will fire up the garden with a burst of warmth. This perennial has an upright growth pattern to three feet. The flowers bloom from mid summer through fall with a color range from warm yellows to browns and coppery tones capped with dark brown or black centers (hence the name Black Eyed Susan).

Prepare the soil with **Master Nurserymen's Gold Rush** as Rudbeckia like well draining soil. Remove fading flower heads to extend the flowering season. Use snail bait on a weekly basis to keep this pest and slugs away from the foliage. Avoid over watering to keep powdery mildew at bay. Use a ready to use

Fungicide if this happens.

Rudbeckia make an excellent cut flower. Just immerse the stems in boiling water for 30 seconds before adding them to your floral arrangements. Alden Lane has a great selection of varieties to choose from.

## Colorful Chrysanthemums Mean Fall Has Arrived!

If there is one flower that really let's us know it's autumn – *it's the Chrysanthemum!* Richly colored and aromatic, the chrysanthemum comes in a dazzling array of colors. Come choose from white, orange, yellow, bronze, maroon, butterscotch and pink. There are low growing "cushions" or "button" types which form low, bushy plants covered with color as well as "spider" mums and the larger flowering exhibition varieties which need frequent pinching until midsummer to encourage full, stocky plants and large blooms. These larger flowering varieties may need staking. Plus, we recommend pinching all but one bud per stem to encourage show stopping blooms. Stop feeding when the buds show color. Remember to remove dead flower heads to force more flower production. Don't overhead water because this encourages blossom rot.

## Don't Forget Autumn Flowers

If you haven't made plans to perk up your summer flowerbeds do so today. Alden Lane Nursery has a full range of transitional annuals that bridge the seasons. For instance, vinca, marigolds, impatiens, and cosmos will add vibrancy until the cold weather really settles in the area. Some of the fall line up includes pansies, violas, nemesia, stock and linaria, snapdragons, Iceland poppies, primrose and alyssum. Use our **Recipe For Good Garden Soil** to get them off to the very best start.
