One of the prettiest and most often overlooked shrubs to plant for late fall and winter color is the ***Camellia sasanqua***. This cousin of the commonly planted ***Camellia japonica*** is more sun tolerant (full morning sun) and depending on the variety makes an excellent gracefully branching ground cover or espaliered shrub, informal hedge as well as a good container plant. You might also plant sasanquas under trees to give color to otherwise green backdrops. Some varieties of *C.sasanqua* begin blooming in November, while others begin in December and January.

# Versatile Sasanqua Camellias Bring Colorful Flowers to the Winter Garden

Alden Lane has received a shipment of heavily budded and some blooming varieties of sasanquas. And it's the best time to choose them while you can see the actual flower shape and the color.

We've listed below the top varieties that have been selected for their outstanding ability to perform. Not only are they covered with hundreds of flowers during the fall and winter but the dark green evergreen foliage is a plus for any garden.

## Early Season Bloom

**Shishi Gashira.** Semi-double to peony form, lovely soft pink blooms. Low spreader.

**Bonanza.** A semi-double to peony form, bloom a rich scarlet enriched by contrast of bright yellow stamen. Low spreader.

## Mid Season Bloom

**Apple Blossom.** Vivid cerise red edges the white petals of these large single blossoms. Lovely contrast is added by the crown of golden stamens. Upright growth pattern.

**Hana Jiman.** Large, semi-double white bloom, petals tipped with pink. Upright growth.

**Jean May.** Large, shell pink with double blossoms. Upright.

**Setsugekka.** Large, semi-double blooms, white ruffled petals and showy yellow stamens. Upright growth.

**White Doves.** White semi-double to loose peony form. Spreader.

## Late Season Bloom

**Yuletide.** Brilliant, fiery red, single blooms centered with bright yellow stamens. Upright.

## Frost Protection Alert!

We live in wonderful mild climate, but we are not tropical or frost free. Many plants suffer each winter because they were not properly protected. Citrus and ornamental plants including hibiscus, bananas, bougainvillea, and some palms will die or suffer damage if left unprotected. Take the time to protect your frost tender perennials and tropical plants from severe winter cold.

- Ideally, a frost tender plant like bougainvillea or hibiscus should be planted in a location that offers some protection naturally. Planting within a sunny courtyard or against a warm wall with overhanging eaves will often provide adequate protection for many frost tender plants.

- If there's room indoors, bring in small potted porch or patio plants choosing an area that provides bright light.

- Wrap plants with new protective plant bags or a protective frost blanket (A spun material that breathes easily but keeps out cold air.)

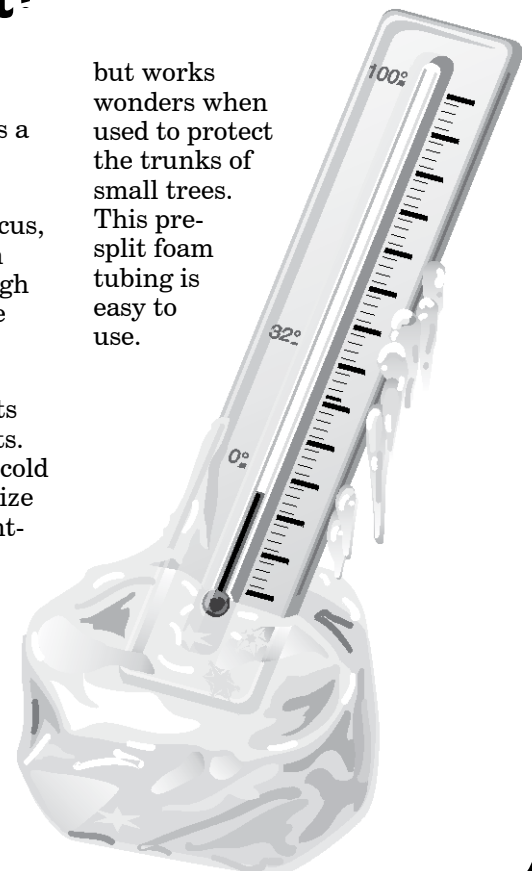
- For outdoor plants simply remembering to keep them well watered in between rain storms is a plus.

- Spray the leaves of frost tenders like: citrus, tropical hibiscus, philodendron, bougainvillea, with **CLOUD COVER** monthly through the winter. This product coats the leaves and stems providing 2 to 3 degrees of protection.

- Decorate cold sensitive plants with outdoor Christmas tree lights. The heat radiated moderates the cold air temperatures. You can maximize this heat source by draping or tenting your plants with translucent "plant blanket" material to create a greenhouse effect. The plant blanket alone will give you 2 to 3 degrees of protection and may be left on all winter.

- Go down to your local hardware store and pick up pipe insulation. It's not only great to keep water pipes from freezing

but works wonders when used to protect the trunks of small trees. This pre-split foam tubing is easy to use.



# Notes for November Gardening

♪ **Don't delay, plant your cool season vegetables now.** We have transplants for *lettuces, spinach, chard, kale, mustard, broccoli, cauliflower, cabbage, brussel sprouts and peas.* From seed you can plant *carrots, radishes, beets & more.* *Onions* are available in 6 packs and our bare root Stockton reds, whites and yellows arrive mid month! Heads of 'seed' *garlic* are here ready to eat or plant. This is the month the commercial growers plant. For those who are not faint hearted and can rig 'heated greenhouse space', we have some *short season tomato plants* to extend your harvest.

♪ Thanksgiving signals the time when we should start **dormant spraying.** Trees and shrubs (especially fruit bearing) are leafless in winter benefit from fall and winter applications of disease and insect controlling products. Thanksgiving, New Years and Valentine's Day are holidays around which you should consider treating. Copper sprays coupled with horticultural oils and spray grip additives are just the prescription. Seek the advice of a Master or California Certified Nursery Professional to guide you in just the right product of choice.

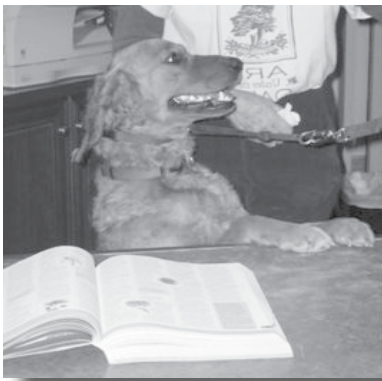
♪ **Seven bulbs make a perfect circle.** Paper whites in a dish make a wonderful house-warming gift for a friend (or for you). Choose a thick, glass or terra cotta container, fill it with seven bulbs, cover with sand, water it and watch it bloom with fragrant, white blossoms in about six weeks.

♪ Thanksgiving marks the ideal weekend in our climate to **plant fall bulbs.** Select bulbs including tulips, hyacinth, muscari, freesias, and narcissus now. Your investment will be rewarded with timely displays of spring color.

♪ **Go Green To Fight Fatigue and Colds!** According to a University of Agriculture/Norway study, indoor plants can reduce fatigue, coughs, sore throats and other cold related illnesses by more than 30 percent, partially by increasing humidity levels and decreasing dust. What a beautiful way to create a healthy environment! See Sue at the Alden Lane Greenhouse and create a healthy home.

♪ **Cut your butterfly bush back** to knee-high now. It will begin growing new foliage right away and will flush out next spring with graceful sprays of new stems followed by trusses of blooms next summer.

♪ **Keep your lawn green this winter** with monthly feedings. It is critical that you feed NOW. If your lawn is not green by Thanksgiving, it's almost impossible to green it up before spring. Most of the lawns in our area are made up of cool season grasses that include: fescue (fess Q); bluegrass and perennial rye varieties. This is their favorite time of year. Missing a "meal" in the dead heat of summer is better than the year's cooler months. Choose our **Master's Fall and Winter Fertilizer.**

Accustomed to a life in the tropics, citrus and hibiscus will keep their blue ribbon showmanship and survive a chill better if they are sheltered from the temperature predators. Of course, as a dog, I'm covered with fur, but for protecting frost tender plants the new frost bags from "Easy Gardener" make a retriever envious.*

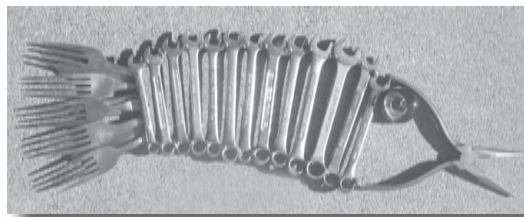

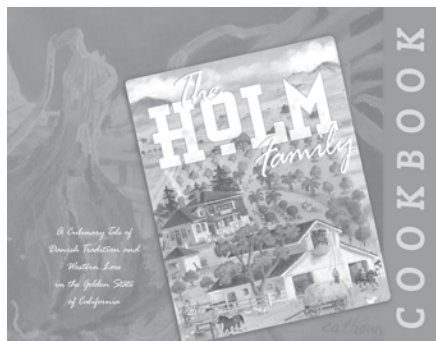

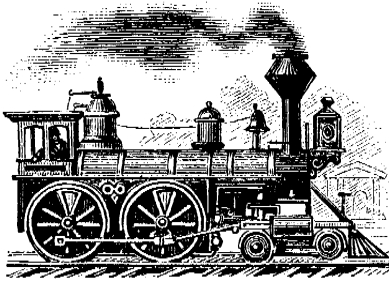
their Danish and Western heritage and traditions, and the Livermore community’s history and culture.

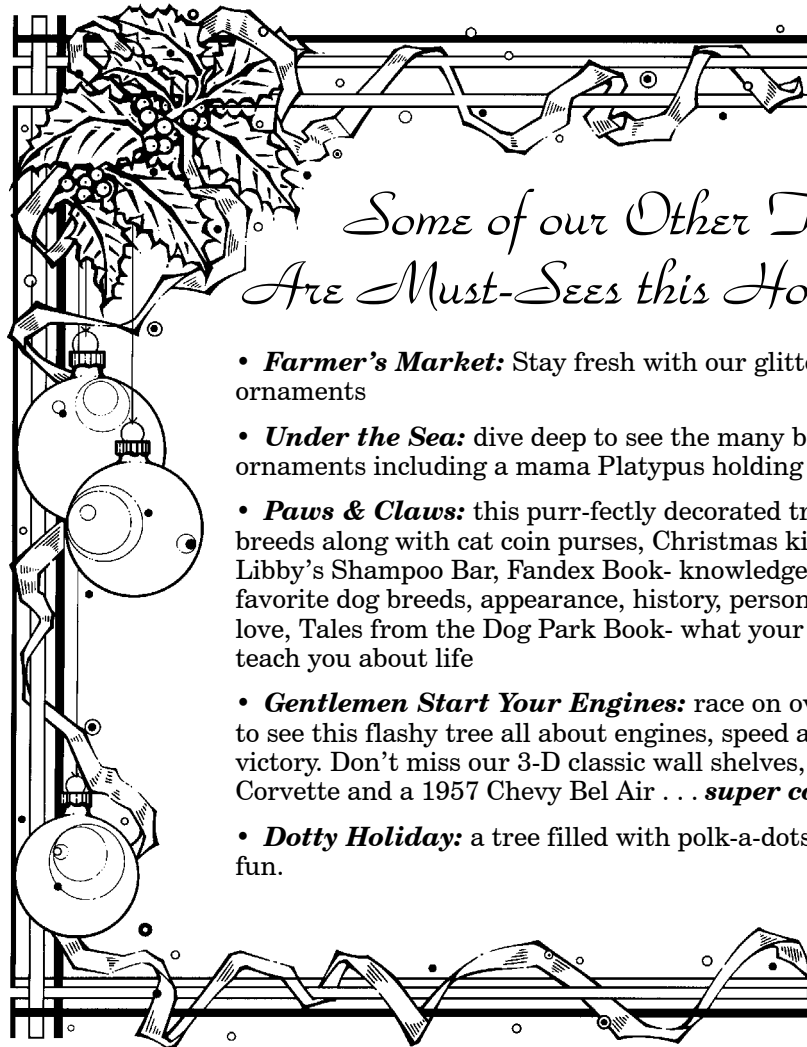

# Good Things To Do For Your Soil In November

**Azomite** is a mined product that provides plants with 70 micro-nutrients rarely available in one place. Spread a 50 lb bag around your landscape 3 to 4 times a year. Gardeners doing so have achieved noticeable improvements, not only in leaf color and vigor, but in fruit and vegetable flavor and production as well. Where do you suppose vegetable set their nutrient content? from the soil of course, this product replenishes and enhances the soil.

**Gypsum** - AKA Calcium sulfate - provides a double blessing of both moderating our alkaline soils and loosening heavy clay soils. Apply 3 times a year over your lawn for better color and more efficient use of fertilizers.

**Paydirt** is an excellent and nutritious mulch containing 25% chicken fertilizer as well as compost. Apply 2 inches over the soil around perennial flowers or over your vegetable areas and let the rain carry organic nutrients into the roots zone. Apply over your lawn for an all natural, organic, slow release fertilizer.

**Chicken Manure** can provide organic nutrition like the above mentioned Paydirt, but one bag goes further. 1/2" layer over lawn or garden provides a generous feeding, beautiful results visible in Spring.

**Iron Products** such as Iron Sulfate or FST help prevent yellow leaves on citrus and keep a lawn greener with less mowing. Apply 2-3 times a year around citrus, azaleas, camellias, over the lawn or anywhere brighter green leaves are desired.

**John and Bob's 100% Organic Soil Optimizer** provides a natural source of Humic acid which nurtures microbial activity in the root zone. Like adding compost without adding compost. Apply 3-4 times a year, especially noticeable improvements for organic vegetable crops.

## Organic Fertilizers

A special note regarding drip systems . . . Many fertilizer products are carried into the soil with water. Drip systems concentrate the distribution of water to a few small areas. Unless the fertilizer is placed directly below the drip emitter, it won't easily make its way down into the root zone. On the other hand, applying an organic fertilizer in the early and late winter assures that fertilizers aided by natural rains, do in fact reach the root zone. Consider an application of **E.B. Stone organic fertilizer** in your landscape now and also early March.

It has been said that if you take care of the soil, the plants will take care of themselves. This is the time of year to do just that. With the onset of cooler weather and hopefully winter rains, there are several good things you can spread over your soil now that winter rains will carry deep into the soil to nourish roots and promote health and vigor next spring. Some of the following items feed the plant, others provide micronutrients, and feed the soil beneficial micro-organisms. Still others improve the soil pH. The end result is a well nourished root system and a better looking landscape next spring.

## Prevent Peach Leaf Curl

Peach leaf curl among other plant diseases is preventable this month as the disease becomes active in the fall long before symptoms become visible on the plant. Spraying copper fungicide now and then again in February will help control this troublesome problem

Peach leaf curl affects most peaches in the area with a puckered, curled leaf in springtime. Better prevented than cured, many gardeners come into Alden Lane in spring or summer, bearing leaf samples far too late to offer any treatments. **November is the month to begin dormant spraying**, so here is your timely reminder. Spray Thanksgiving week-end every year. Make it a tradition!

We offer three types of copper fungicide.

**Micro-Cop** is the strongest option, at the top of our recommendations. It comes in a powder, you mix it with a spreader-sticker and water, and apply using a pump sprayer.

We also offer **Liqui-Cop** which is easier to use. Simply dilute and apply.

A third option is practical for smaller trees and is super easy. **Bonide Copper Fungicide** is ready to use in a pre-mixed spray bottle.

Peach leaf curl as well as many other fungus diseases live on year to year on fallen foliage. Take this time to prevent the ongoing spread of diseases among fruit trees with a good fall cleanup. With a rake in



hand, remove all debris from beneath fruit trees and remove any dried up old fruit from within the tree.

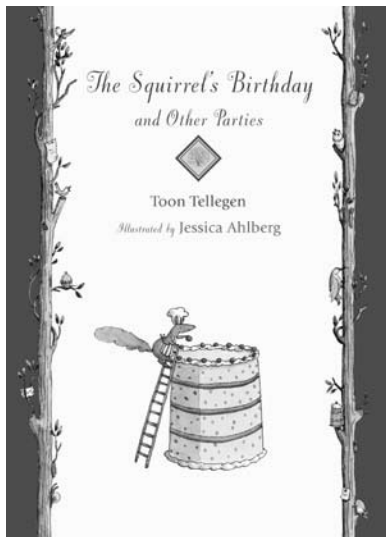

## Winning Salsa Recipe

### *Roasted Corn & Sweet Cherry Tomato Salsa* by Fred Rubis

2 ears	Brentwood Sweet White Corn
3 cups	Sweet Cherry Tomatoes – quartered, length wise
1 or 2	Avocados – diced
1 bunch	Green Onions –sliced thin
1	Jalapeno – minced, very fine
1 cup	Cilantro – chopped
1	Lime – juiced
2 to 4 Tbls.	Extra Virgin Olive Oil
2 to 4 Tbls.	Premium EVVO – Livermore's "Olivina Arbequia" is suggested
	Kosher Salt
	Fresh Ground Pepper

- Remove husks from corn, coat with EVOO. Place on hot grill, turning until caramelization apparent on all sides. Let cool, then cut corn from cobs and place in large bowl
- Add quartered tomatoes and sliced onion to corn until desired balance achieved
- Dice avocados – place in second bowl and immediately coat with lime juice
- Add desired amount of avocado to salsa mixture, reserving the lime juice
- Add minced jalapeno to taste
- Drizzle with premium EVOO and reserved lime juice to taste
- Add salt and pepper to taste
- Add cilantro to taste

# HOW TO FIND ALDEN LANE NURSERY
